## Nib-Bit Bracelet



## Material:

- Nib-bit beads
- Miyuki 15/0 Round beads

Tools:

- Beading needle \#11-12
- Thread zap or scissors
- 2 mm round Czech Glass Pearls
- 6 mm round Czech Glass Pearls
- ca 1.5 m Fireline 6 lb.
- 1 small magnetic clasp (or another metal clasp of your choice)

1.Take any small bead and make it into a stop bead by sewing through it twice, like shown in the picture.

Leave a thread end of at least 10 cm (4 inches).

2. Pick up one nib-bit in the hole in the wide end according to the picture, one 2 mm round, one nib-bit, one 2 mm round and one nib-bit.

The nib-bits form a group of three that all lies in the same direction.

3. Pick up one 15/0, one nib-bit in the hole in the thin end according to the picture, one $15 / 0$, one nib-bit, one $15 / 0$, one nib-bit and one 15/0.

4. Repeat step 2 and 3 until your bracelet is long enough for your wrist. The length will shrink a lot when you add the 6 mm rounds later, but if you use the small metal clasp from Beadsmith you can follow these recommendations:
$14 \times 3$ nib-bits fits a wrist that measures about 15-15.5cm (5.9-6.1 inches)
$15 \times 3$ nib-bits fits a wrist that measures about 16.5-17.5 cm (6.5-6.9 inches)
$16 \times 3$ nib-bits fits a wrist that measures $17.5-18 \mathrm{~cm}$ (6.9-7.1 inches)
$17 \times 3$ nib-bits fits a wrist that measures about 18.5-19 cm (7.3-7.5 inches)

If your measurements are between sizes, use a bigger clasp or make the loop that holds the clasp bigger, or add an extra jump ring between the bracelet and the clasp.

5. We shall now make a little loop that holds one end of the clasp.

Pick up four 15/0 and one half of your clasp. (You now have a total of five 15/0 on your thread!)

Sew through the other hole of nib-bit 1 according to the picture.

6. Pick up one 2 mm round.

Sew through nib-bit 2.

Pick up one 2 mm round.
Sew through nib-bit 3.

7. Pick up one 15/0.

Sew through nib-bit 4.
Pick up one $15 / 0$.
Sew through nib-bit 5.
Pick up one 15/0.
Sew through nib-bit 6.
Pick up one 15/0.
Sew through nib-bit 7.

8. Repeat step 6 and 7 until you reach the other end of the bracelet.

9. We shall now make the little loop that holds the other end of the clasp.

Pick up four 15/0 and the other half of your clasp. (You now have a total of five $15 / 0$ on your thread!)

Sew through the other hole of nib-bit 1. Continue sewing through 2 mm round 1 , nib-bit 2 , 2 mm round 2 and nib-bit 3 according to the picture.

10. Pick up one $15 / 0$, one 6 mm round bead and one 15/0.

Sew through nib-bit 7, 2 mm round 5 , nib-bit 8 , 2 mm round 6 and nib-bit 9 .
11. Repeat step 10 in every "downhill" until you reach the other end of the bracelet.

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12. At the end of the bracelet, you fill the last "downhill" like this:

Pick up one $15 / 0$, one 6 mm round and one 15/0.

Sew through all the 15/0 in the loop that holds one end of the clasp.
Continue sewing through nib-bit 1 , 2 mm round 1 , nib-bit 2,
2 mm round 2 and nib-bit 3 .
13. Fill the "uphills" just like in step 10 by picking up one $15 / 0$, one 6 mm round bead and one 15/0. Sew through the next nib-bit, 2 mm round, nib-bit, 2 mm round and nib-bit.

14. At the end of the bracelet, you fill the last "uphill" like this:

Pick up one $15 / 0$, one 6 mm round and one 15/0.

Sew through all the $15 / 0$ in the loop that holds one end of the clasp.

Continue sewing through nib-bit 1, 2 mm round 1 , nib-bit 2.

15. Finish off the bracelet like this: Make a knot around the thread between nib-bit 2 and 2 mm round 2 two times.

Sew through 2 mm round 2 . Cut or zap the thread.

## 16. Remove the stop bead.

Thread the needle on the thread end.
Sew through all the $15 / 0$ in the loop that holds one half of the clasp.

Continue sewing through $15 / 01$, 6 mm round $1,15 / 02$, nib-bit 4 , 2 mm round 3 and nib-bit 5 .

Make a knot around the thread between nib-bit 5 and 2 mm round 4 two times.
Sew through 2 mm round 4 .
Cut or zap the thread.
Your bracelet is now finished!
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
